### **Merritton Threads**

Once in a while in my research I come across an unexpected Merritton connection. Sometimes it brings a discovery and sometimes it leads to a mystery. It has happened twice in the last six weeks, and true to form, one is a mystery and one a revelation.

Our mystery is a mention of the Hand Fireworks Company, found in a tiny scrap of newspaper in my Granny Astley's old photos. It is just a single line of text that mentioned that the first fireworks 'factory' of the William T. Hand Fireworks Company was in Merritton! I had never heard of William T. Hand before, but a little investigation taught me that not only did Mr. Hand establish a fireworks business locally but that it is still in business as the oldest firm of that kind in Canada!

Further poking showed me that the actual location was in doubt. I contacted the firm and my

inquiry was fielded by the firm 'historian', D. John Witherspoon, who turned out to be the President and CEO. John didn't have more detail of the first location, but it might have been in Thorold, where Mr. Hand settled after emigrating from England via Newark, New Jersey. My little scrap of paper said it was in Merritton. As a 'mountain girl', I'd like to think it was on that fuzzy border section along the townline

somewhere, a sort of no-man's/every man's area. I'd love to hear from anyone who knows the actual spot.

Our revelation is that a Merritton-born girl became the first in Canada to enter the field of 'Industrial Nursing.' Now we call it Occupational Health Services, but when M. Olive Bradley entered the field, it was a new and innovative program to help workers stay healthy at work and at home, and to assist their families as well.

Martha 'Olive' Bradley was born in Merritton in 1880, to Abraham and Jane Bradley, the fourth child of 4 daughters and six sons. Though she is identified as Martha in the early census records, we know that she used the name Olive when she graduated from the Toronto General Hospital Training School for Nurses in 1907. After schooling, Olive applied for work at Plymouth Cordage in Welland, a branch office of the main plant built in 1906, where the company supplied rope and in particular binder twine for the farmers of the Prairies. Olive Bradley lived in a company house, along with her parents and younger siblings who all followed her to Welland. Plymouth Cordage was a conscientious employer, providing homes for their employees as well as a kindergarten/day care, a recreational centre with pool and billiards, bowling alley, library and sewing classes. Summer sports and agricultural fairs were held regularly.

Miss Bradley travelled to Plymouth Massachusetts to learn the 'ropes' from the plant nurse there and

returned to establish the same comprehensive service in Welland. She was on duty 24 hours a day in case of emergency and held daily medical clinics at the factory while spending her afternoons visiting the employees' families, assisting with health care and advising on nutrition and health for all the families.

William Hand

By the time of Olive's retirement in 1940, the idea of having a Health and Safety officer on hand had become an industrial norm. M. Olive Bradley laid the foundation for the others to follow.

Merritton had a number of Bradley families in residence in Olive's young days. I'd love to hear from anyone related to or otherwise associated with the Abraham and Jane Bradley family.



# Lefty Vision

In 1965 we purchased our first Merritton home on Park Ave. For some reason as kids we seldom ventured into this part of town, preferring the Chestnut Street area instead. Here there were many large families, the Griffins, Savoies and the Scotts just to name a few. Our house was #88 and the Savoies, #90. If this sounds ominous, it wasn't. They turned out to be the best neighbours anyone could have. In fact, on our first day after we had moved in, Denis came over and welcomed us as new friends.

Their home was always a beehive of activity. They were led by the tandem of Omar (Lefty) and his lovely Irish wife Edith. Their pet names for each other were the French Poodle (Lefty) and the Irish Setter (Edith).

On one particular morning the activity significantly increased. Lefty was on the move. For the next couple of days his car was in and out of the driveway constantly, especially in the early mornings. He waved a few times but it was obvious he was on a mission. I could always tell because he would get an intense look on his face. We were a little concerned and hoped it wasn't a serious problem. Then suddenly things calmed down.

I was sitting out in the backyard a few days later enjoying a wobbly pop when I heard a whirring noise and noticed Lefty's TV aerial constantly turning and stopping time and time again. A real mystery. What could be going on? The next Saturday afternoon, all was revealed.

That morning Lefty gave me a shout. He asked me if I wanted to watch a ball game with him. No ordinary game, but the one where Denny McLain of Detroit Tiger fame was going for his 30th win of the season. I gladly accepted. But, Lefty being Lefty, I took my own beer as he drank



a witch's brew called Dow Ale. I think he kept that brand on the market as I knew of no one else who drank it. So that afternoon, my twelve pack in hand, I bid my wife farewell, and ventured over.

All excited, Lefty welcomed me in. Downstairs we went and the reason for all the activity was revealed and it was an amazing sight. Settling into an old easy chair I took it all in. On the wall in front of me was at least five TV sets. On garbage days Lefty had gone out and, while touring the neighbourhood, had picked up an assortment of old TV's that people had discarded, making sure that they all had clickers. If they didn't work he took out the tubes and went to Main's drug store where there was a tube testing machine. In this regard Mr. Main was way ahead of his time. Any offending tube was discarded and a new one was purchased on the spot. When he got the TVs working, they were mounted on the wall. There was a maze of wires in the back and I thought I

spotted a spark or two where some were joined.

Beside Lefty was a small cooler, a large plate of cheese and crackers and numerous clickers along with a rotor control. With a proud and contented look on his face, he showed me his amazing system. Each TV had a number on it which corresponded with the matching clicker. In this way he controlled the volume. When activating the rotor control, the stations slowly changed until he arrived at the chosen one. Some sets turned to snow or showed ghostly images as they changed and slowly the ball game came into view. He proudly demonstrated the whole system to me then, settling in, we watched the ball game and drank the beer.

Occasionally Edith would peek downstairs, look at us and roll her eyes.

It was a good ballgame and Denny did win his 30<sup>th</sup>. History was made and not in just the ballgame, but in the way we watched it. Staggering home I heard that familiar whirring sound and had a thought. Merritton never realized, but at one time they had their own television network called "The Lefty Vision TV Network".

# Fraser Loveman - He Kept the Music Playing

Family, friends and the curious attended a Celebration of Life for former Merritton High student and local rockstar Fraser Loveman at the CAW Building on June 24th.

The man being celebrated drew people from every area of the region. I spoke with fans and some of his former fellow performers from Port Elgin, London Ontario, Windsor, the GTA, a large contingent from Hamilton and beyond, who came to the city just for this event. The person that traveled the furthest distance, an American artist known as LGB from a city called Warner Robins in Georgia USA, was very typical of many who turned out for this get together. She had never personally met Fraser Loveman, knew of him through his incredible musical history Facebook page that had approximately 1700 followers. Through messages online which he took time personally to answer, she had promised at some point to travel north for a visit with her friend and felt compelled to keep that promise even if it couldn't be done during his lifetime.



The room at the CAW building was decorated with a display of various items from his musical and theatre career from posters to wardrobe and his personal artwork. Many gathered to view seldom seen video of Fraser's days with the Modbeats which played on a near continuous basis and of course, music, music, music in the background could be heard through the constant guest chatter. A microphone was set up and guests were encouraged to share stories and memories.

The common thread that was apparent throughout all the stories was "respect". The respect people had for him and the respect he had for others. Family members handed out coasters depicting Fraser, a commemorative gift to guests in attendance - sure to be a local collector's item.

I want to personally send kudos out to the organizers for making arrangements and delivering the food leftovers to the local Salvation Army, a gesture greatly appreciated by that charity I'm told. It was commented to the organizers on more than one occasion that the event was something Fraser would have approved, and I would most certainly think that to be the case. He was a man who loved to keep the music playing!

### **MERRITTON WARD ELECTION ISSUE**

# St. Catharines General Hospital Redevelopment?

In the summer of 2014, I confidently placed a picture of the soon to be redeveloped St. Catharines General Hospital on the cover of our election issue. The new replacement hospital had been open for a year as of that March. In the spring of 2013, the Niagara Health System website promised that the 'residents and businesses in the Queenston area of St. Catharines can look forward to a new vibe in their neighbourhood.' A Niagara Falls developer Panoramic Properties Inc. - Butera Group had purchased the property with the purpose of changing it into residences. Some of the historic features of the old hospital were to be incorporated into the design. Then NHS Interim President and CEO Sue Matthews said that, "The NHS made a pledge early on that we would not let the St. Catharines General or Ontario Street site go dark."

A public information session meeting was held on May 27, 2014, hosted by the City of St. Catharines and the Butera Group to provide the Queenston Street community with plans for utilizing the shell of the former General Hospital site. The meeting at Connaught Public School was well attended with over 100 people interested in the nature of the proposal of residential apartments and an indoor recreational fitness facility. The agent for the owner indicated at that meeting that they would make formal application for site plan approval from the City and undertake a number of studies, such as traffic, parking and servicing, to assess how the proposal will function on the site as well as be integrated within the community in a manner that improves the streetscape along Queenston Street. Also announced at the time was a reconstruction of Queenston Street scheduled for 2015. The construction project actually began in May of 2017 and continued into the fall.

Then we heard that new owners - Queenston Oakdale
Limited of Ancaster – had acquired the building in December
2016 and they planned to tear the building down in order to build
a multi-residential development such as a townhouse community.
As far as we know, no further action has been taken on this
development. The St. Catharines General Hospital has gone dark.

### **MERRITTON CONSTRUCTION UPDATES**

### **BURLEIGH HILL AREA CONSTRUCTION**

In the last issue of Merritton Matters, we let you know about the public consultations for the Burleigh Hill construction work (Project Number: P13-019-01) which includes Burleigh Hill Drive from Glendale to Warkdale Drive, Glengarry from Glendale Avenue to Glenhurst Circle and Warkdale Drive from Glendale Avenue to Rockdale Avenue. This project is a collaboration between the City of St. Catharines and the Niagara Region, and includes:

- Constructing a sanitary sewer on Burleigh Hill Drive and Warkdale Drive;
- Replacing an existing cast iron watermain on Burleigh Hill Drive;
- Reconstructing Burleigh Hill Drive from Glendale Avenue to Warkdale Drive including wider lanes for vehicle and bicycle shared use, a northbound left turn lane onto Warkdale Drive, and a raised traffic median and crosswalk at Warkdale Drive;
- Intersection improvements at Burleigh Hill Drive and Glendale Drive including new crosswalks and improved traffic signals;
- Replacing the existing sidewalk with new sidewalk and crossings on Burleigh Hill Drive;
- Installing new sidewalks on Warkdale Drive in front of Sainte-Marguerite-Bourgeoys; and
- Installing new sidewalk on Glengarry Road from Glendale Avenue to Glendale Terrace apartment building.

### 2018 RESURFACING ON ROCKWOOD

Rockwood Avenue will be resurfaced this summer between Woodrow St. and Pic Leeson Park and between Thornton and Hartzel Road by Rankin Construction Inc.

### NEW CONDO BUILDING ON MERRITT STREET

An interior renovation project of an existing building at 405 Merritt Street is going through the Site Plan process. Merrittonians will recognize this address as the site of the former St. James Anglican Church which was built first in Port Dalhousie in 1841 and then moved to Merritton in 1871. The current owner is seeking Draft Plan of Standard

Condominium Approval. A public meeting for the Condominium approval was held on August 13th. The church building, renamed St. James Lofts, will be converted to loft condos.

### MOFFATT STREET

The City of St. Catharines is planning to carry out the reconstruction of Moffatt Street from the south limit to the north limit. This will include a new road platform consisting of a new asphalt roadway, sidewalks, curbs, streetlighting, and drainage improvements. Construction could begin as early as spring of 2019 pending budget approval. In advance of the roadworks, the utility companies (Alectra, Bell and Cogeco) are working to move their infrastructure. The utility work is currently ongoing and anticipated to be completed by the end of the year. A Public Information Centre was held on July 10, 2018. Plans presented are available on the project web page at http://www.stcatharines.ca/moffatt.

# While we're talking about updates to neighbourhoods, we're wondering what ever happened to the...

### **OAKDALE-MOFFAT AREA STUDY?**

With the push for the second bridge to connect Moffatt Street to Oakdale, it makes us wonder what ever happened to the study in 2007/2008 paid for by property owners in the Oakdale-Moffatt area. The \$25,000 study was completed to expand the Community Improvement Program to an area bordering the first and second Welland canals and the Garden City Golf Course, the Trillium Rail line, the CN line and Highway 406. The report came after a public open house where residents were invited to give their input followed by another public workshop to confirm the general vision for the area. Finally, an open house was held to present a draft action plan. Parts of the plan included infilling on the small vacant and under-utilized lots on Oakdale Avenue, Phelps Street, Haight Street and Smythe Street, building soccer fields where there is space along the Merritt trail in order to increase traffic and adding interpretive signs along the trail to explain the canal's history. Questions about this study to City Hall staff has not yielded any information to date.





# **MERRITTON VOTES!**

The municipal election will happen on Monday, Oct. 22, 2018. Log into www.voterlookup.ca to confirm or update your information for the 2018 Municipal and School Board Election; add an elector name to an address; and change school support.

### YOUR CHOICES

Check the city's website for the most current list of candidates for municipal positions. These council and school board terms of office will run from December 1, 2018 to November 14, 2022.

**Mayor -** One Mayor will be elected within the city. Choose from incumbent Walter Sendzik or challengers Tunde Soniregun, Richard Stephens or Johnny Tischler.

**Regional Councillors -** Six regional councillors will be chosen to represent the City of St. Catharines at large at the Regional Municipality of Niagara.

School Board Trustees - There are four different possibilities for trustees depending on your eligibility. Four trustees for the English-language Public District School Board are to be elected and this is your default choice unless you are qualified to vote for a separate or French board. One (1) English-language Catholic District School Board trustee will be elected from Merritton Ward combined with the City of Thorold for separate school board supporters.

Melinda Chartrand, the French Separate School Board Trustee, has been acclaimed as has Véronique Emery, the French Public School Board Trustee.

### **JENNIE AND JEFF**

The very familiar names of two Merritton residents won't be on our Municipal election ballots. Jeff Burch, a former Merritton Ward Councillor was recently elected to be the MPP in the Welland riding. Jeff was elected first in 2006 and then re-elected in 2010 to represent our ward. While on council, he served as the city's budget committee chair and helped to bring the Meridian Centre through the approval process. The Welland riding includes Welland, Port Colborne, Thorold and part of south St. Catharines. And, of course, Jennie Stevens was also elected to the Ontario Legislature as an MPP and will represent St. Catharines residents on behalf of the NDP. Jennie had represented the ward of Merritton since 2003 and so naturally chose a Merritt Street pizzeria to bring together her supporters for the election night celebration. (One of St. Catharines' other candidates, Sandie Bellows, also held her election night gathering for supporters in Merritton, at the Stone Mill Inn.) Both Jeff and Jennie served us well in Merritton and we might say that they 'cut their teeth' working to support our community before moving to the provincial arena.
